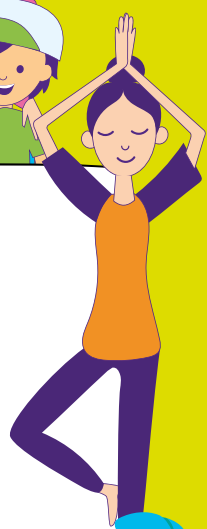

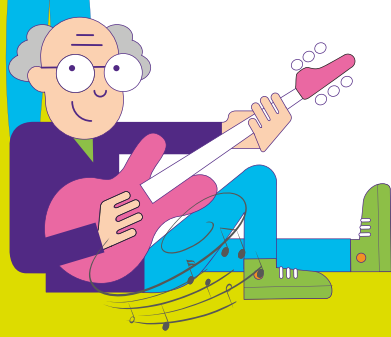

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About this guide

The pandemic has been tumultuous, shaking up all of our lives, but it has revealed just how important close and meaningful relationships are to our collective wellbeing, not least the very special grandparent and grandchild relationship and the importance of connections across generations. We are delighted to publish this guide as a contribution to Global Intergenerational Week 2022, the aim of which is to inspire people around the world to start or restart intergenerational connections.

Children's books are for people of all ages. For this guide we have joined forces with Together Old and Young, or TOY, an international project that promotes the value of intergenerational learning between young children and older adults, and Hibernia College, the largest provider of teacher education in Ireland.

This guide is for everyone who would like to see those intergenerational connections reflected in books – older adults and younger children having time to get to know each other, learn from each other and develop a mutual understanding whilst also having fun. This carefully curated booklist for ages 0–12 features a diversity of friendships and relationships between old and young, as well as giving insight into the universal aging process.

The guide is also for early years educators and primary school teachers who see possibilities for bringing learning beyond the early childhood education setting or primary school walls. The books and tips suggested in this guide will help you start conversations with the children you work with about the different kinds of roles grandfathers and grandmothers play in children's lives in the here and now.

The last two years may have left some children feeling anxious, and some may have experienced loss. A number of the selected books also help children to deal with difficult subjects such as loss of a grandparent or 'grandfriend'. The tip page will give you ideas for what to look for in selecting books with intergenerational themes and suggestions for how you can use them. At the back, you will also find a list of organisations that can help you develop your intergenerational practice.

Tips for choosing and sharing intergenerationally themed books

When choosing books, look out for:

Positivity

- Choose a majority of texts that depict positive images of older adults who are happy and healthy and engaged with daily life.
- Look for books with characters who have a range of warm, healthy loving relationships with others, both young and old.

Agism and age accuracy

- Beware of negative terminology in reference to aging.
- Avoid books with too many age-related markers such as walking sticks, decrepit appearance, hair in buns.
- Look for illustrations that offer realistic and respectful depictions of older adults: remember many grandparents of preschoolers and primary school children are in their fifties and sixties.

Diversity

- Grandparents and other older adult characters, and characters of all ages, should represent the diversity of our world (diversity in culture, language, race, countries of origin, religion, family structure, age and so on).
- Look for characters who are 'grandfriends' or 'social grandparents', who may not be related to a child (or children) but who have a significant role in their life.
- Show older characters who have diverse interests, hobbies, talents and professional responsibilities.

Continuity and lifelong growth and learning

- Find stories that demonstrate the continuity across different phases of life.
- Look for characters who continue to pursue their talents, hobbies and interests and remain creative and active.



When sharing books

If you're reading books aloud with individual or groups of children:

- Build intrigue from the first introduction of the book to the children.
- Take time to talk about the cover and the title and encourage the children to predict what the story might be about.
- Before you start reading, and depending on the age of the child or children, you can go on a picture walk – a walk through the book's illustrations to see what is happening.

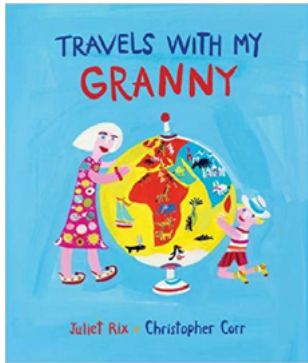
Try these conversation starters after you have finished reading the story:

- How would you describe [older character in book]?
- What kind of things do [younger character] and [older character] like to do together?
- Does [older character in book] remind you of anyone in your life?
- What do you admire about [older character]?
- What would you have done if you were [a character] in the story?
- What would you do if you had a problem like [older or younger character]?
- Did the book make you wonder about anything?
- Why do you think the author wanted to tell this story?

Remember, no single book can capture the range of life experiences and relationships across generations. Aim to collect a variety of books, both fiction and non-fiction. We hope this guide can help you choose a rich selection from the available books.

Sharing books with intergenerational themes can also be part of a programme of activities in an early childhood setting or school or other spaces in the community where older adults and children spend time together. At the back of this guide you can find out more about organisations that provide information and resources about intergenerational practice.

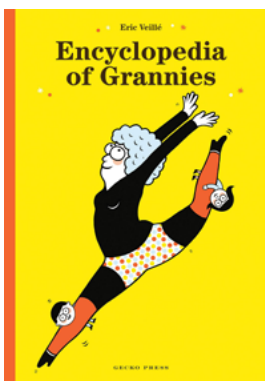

Leitner uses simple yet powerful text and equally minimal and effective illustrations. The book will delight and console children who face transition and change. And childhood is full of such transitions. (Age 0–7)

This is a fun and tender reminder that grannies are a comfort and a constant, and even children who don't have their own granny still encounter them as part of daily life. 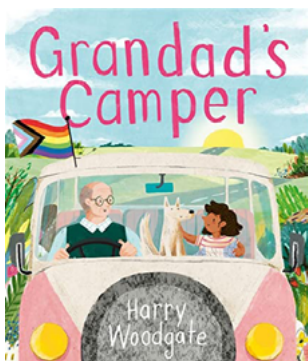

Grandad's Camper is a beautiful story of a modern mixed-race family experiencing loss. Their granddaughter helps Grandad process his grief by revisiting treasured memories and honouring the exciting life the men had together. Through heartfelt storytelling and vibrant illustrations, Woodgate pays homage to family and LGBTQ+ experience, and reminds us to cherish the memory and legacy of our loved ones. (Age 4–7)

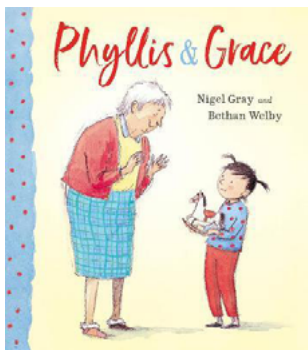

Wordless, picture-rich Grandpa widens everyone's horizons and helps create a new community of learners, artists and, eventually, friends in this beautiful book. (Age 5–7)

Grace enjoys visiting her neighbour, Phyllis, even though Phyllis initially appears fairly eccentric and more and more forgetful, putting paintings in the fridge and filling the kettle with milk. Grace isn't fazed by Phyllis's progressing dementia and Phyllis, while increasingly confused, remains mostly cheerful and is always happy to see her young friend. The succinct, repetitive text manages both humour and empathy, while keeping the focus on this unusual but strong friendship. The illustrations strike a similar balance and infuse the story with a soft gentleness. (Age 5–7)

This is a timeless story about the wonder of imagination and the value of intergenerational friendship. (Age 5–8)

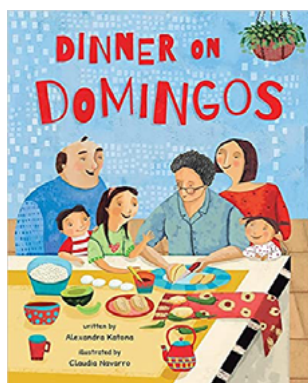

Quietly, Grandpa takes Miyuki's hand, and together they walk along the river, observing the clouds, drinking raindrops falling from the sky. A whole day passes peacefully in landscapes full of wonder. In this third story in the series, Miyuki and Grandpa discover the joys of sharing simple moments together. (Age 5–8)

A gentle story, sure to strike a chord with anyone who loves their grandmother and treasures the times spent together. (Age 5–8)

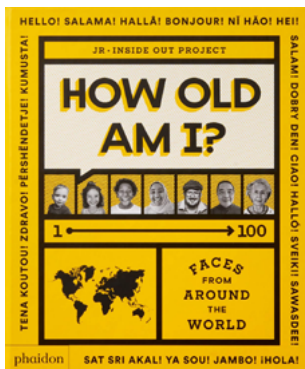

Alejandra's favourite day of the week is Sunday, when she gets to spend the day with her large extended family. This book perfectly captures the warm chaos of a multi-generational family day (plus pets!). Alejandra's abuelita, who speaks mostly Spanish, is, like all good grandmothers, quietly at the centre of it all, keeping her culture alive and communicating vibrantly through food and music and dancing. 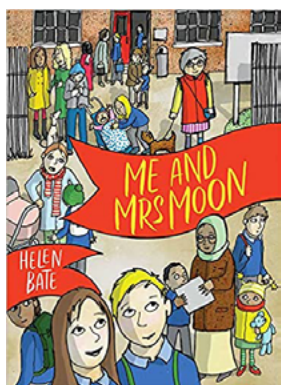

Touching on the restorative and redeeming power of nature and the joy of storytelling, this is a moving and emotive picturebook. (Age 5–8)

This book visually highlights the ageing process, showcasing portraits of humans from across the world, starting with Gwen in the UK (aged one) all the way to Beatrice in the USA (aged one hundred). But more than that – it takes young readers around the world to hear different people’s backgrounds and life stories, opens up conversations about culture and family, puts value on life experience and introduces the concepts of emigration, immigration and travel. It serves to highlight our differences as well as our similarities and teaches the reader how to say hello in lots of languages. (Non-fiction, Age 6–10)

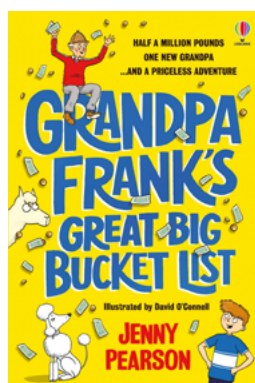
Maisie and Dylan’s older neighbour Mrs Moon may as well be another grandmother to them. But this close relationship is tested when a series of increasingly odd behaviours leads them to believe that Mrs Moon is not herself. They want to help her, but what can they do? This sensitive portrayal of the effects of dementia is emotional but rich, too, in humour and levity. An excellent book for families with affected loved ones, and a worthwhile graphic novel for the classroom library. (Age 8–12)

When Effie lands on Selimene and Carlota’s doorstep as an orphan, she has no idea that magic awaits inside. Selimene and Carlota (two older aunts she’s never met) are in fact witches and, as it turns out, Effie takes after them. A modern story of family, friendship and good witchcraft set in a busy New York neighbourhood, *The Witches of Brooklyn* is a great graphic novel with plenty of heart and humour – and some brilliant, strong characters that defy age stereotypes of all kinds. Frank inherits a fortune and a grandfather he didn’t know he had. The catch? He must spend the money on looking after Frank Senior Senior, and then, maybe, there’ll be a ‘greater reward’ for him. The duo of blustery, pig-headed and sometimes ‘fuzzy’ grandpa and cash-obsessed, secretly lonely grandson works to hilarious effect in this madcap adventure of disastrous dog shows and hot-air-balloon fiascos. There’s also plenty of heart as the characters eventually allow their hurt and hopes to surface and work towards the ultimate reward: family reconciliation. (Age 8–12)

Gottfried Junior is very close to his grandpa, who is seriously ill in hospital and hating every minute of his enforced rest. The pair are natural rebels, and soon they plot to 'spring' Grandpa from the hospital for one last adventure. Dealing with dark themes of sickness, death and family miscommunication in an honest way, *The Runaways* still manages to be an entertaining and sometimes very funny read. The text's wry humour is also reflected in the illustrations, which have a comic-book/graphic-novel feel. Highly recommended. (Age 8–12)



JASBINDER BILAN **ASHA AND THE SPIRIT BIRD**

This is a warm and heartfelt tale of a girl who travels across the Himalayas to search for her father. When Asha discovers that her papa has not sent any money in months and her family might lose their farm, she sets out on a journey to find him. Along with best friend Jeevan and a bird that Asha is certain is the spirit of her beloved Nanijee, they find adventure, hardship, courage and hope as they travel to bring Papa back home. Prez Mellows is sent from his home with his grandfather to stay with a foster family who are loud, warm and unable to see that newcomer Sputnik is not a dog but an alien intent on writing a guide to the best things about life on earth. With Prez in tow, Sputnik engages in some wild, hilarious and slightly illegal adventures, culminating in a reunion at the Shangri-La Nursing Home. This life-affirming story – funny and touching by turns – is a beautiful examination of the relationship between a boy and his grandfather. (Age 9–11)
